# Reception Class Assembly!




Nursery – we are in the early stages planning a little sing song for the adults!

# Plans for the Summer Term Part 2



We are so excited to be planning for the future in school and to the return of more 'normal' times. However, although there are many changes in restrictions in terms of home and family life like meeting indoors, hugging and being able to go out to pubs and restaurants, guidance for schools remains largely unchanged.

We are still operating in bubbles, following the hands, face, space, ventilation guidance and minimising contact with shared resources. Our other protocols and routines will also remain for summer term part 2. We know there are lots of children across the city who are having to self-isolate due to bubble closures. It is unlikely that there will be any huge changes to the guidance in the final part of the summer term, but as soon as we receive any and can return to more of the things we love, we will let you know.

Regrettably 5 staff members have had their own children selfisolating over the last two weeks so we understand first-hand how

frustrating this could be for the children and grown-ups if we found ourselves in this position after a successful return to school as of 8<sup>th</sup> March and when we are so close to the summer holidays.

## Summer Holidays

Please note that if you travel abroad with your family over the summer holidays it will be vital that you follow the protocols in place for the specific country that you choose to travel to on your return to the UK.

Where the need to quarantine is identified, families will be expected to follow the guidelines even if this means children are required to be absent from school. Remote learning will be put in place from your child's new class teacher should this be the case.

## Jubilee Road

Please be careful when crossing the road near the junction with Jubilee Road. It has been reported that some cars are travelling through the red lights.

## Belongings from Home
