After 3 weeks, our whole school attendance is 97.88%.



Well done everyone who has been at school every day possible. Our winning year group is Year 4 at 99% whilst our winning class is Class 9 at 99.5%.

Nursery 1 is at 87.1% and Nursery 2 is at 94.4% - both below the targeted 97%. Can we increase this over the next few weeks Nursery part timers?



Reading at Archibald

It has been lovely to see the children settle back into school life and continue to be confident and enthusiastic readers; thank you for your support with your child's reading. As we move into next half term, we will continue to prioritise reading across the school.

Key Stage 2 Reading Worms



Our reading worms are used as a reward system to promote reading, motivate pupils to read at home and to celebrate effort and achievement. Each child in years 3 and 4 is issued with a 'reading worm' which is kept at school.

Once a week, teachers will stamp entries in individual reading diaries, if a child has 5 entries, they can then colour a section of their worm. At the end of each half term, all pupils with a completed worm will go into a prize draw for a new

book; we will repeat this at the end of every half term.

Entries can be a written comment or a signature to indicate that your child has read at home. Reading can include school books, reading books from home, magazines, recipes, instructions for games, leaflets, posters etc.

Early Years and Key Stage 1 Reading Recognition Reward

Each half term, class teachers will nominate a pupil for outstanding effort in reading and they will be invited to choose a new book.

Please remember that re-reading a school book helps children to recognise the key words, build fluency and confidence and can also focus on talking about the events and images.



Archibald Recommended Reads

Have you looked at our Archibald 'recommended reads' for each year group. At the start of the academic year, every child was given a book list inside their reading diary.

The aim is to see how many of these books they can read before the end of July. Parents and carers are asked to record and sign on the sheet provided. Certificates are given at the end of each term.

Each morning, we place two trolleys at the front of school. One is filled with 'Books for grown-ups' and another with 'Books for children'

The idea is that you can 'Take a book' and 'Leave a book'.

As you take your first book to read, please leave a book for someone else to enjoy.

If you do take a book to read, you can then return it back once you have finished with it and collect another.
